PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD: As there were no members of the public in attendance, no comments were received.

SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENTS/PRESENTATIONS:

a. Kentfield Fire District Water Rescue Program – Referring to the *Kentfield Fire Water Rescue* document created by Captain Kris Viau, Chief Pomi stated the document was meant to serve as a brief presentation on what Station 17 has to offer its community and County. Chief Pomi provided an overview on the water rescue program, noting Kentfield Fire District has five certified rescue swimmers, three of them also being certified as water craft and boat operators. The current water rescue fleet is made up of 2 water rescue crafts: 15R7 and 15R8, also referred to as jet skis. The water fleet consists of an IRB as well, which is an inflatable rescue boat. The IRB enables water rescue crews to perform different types of operations while being able to reach shallow water. Having this water rescue program provides more availability to assist in emergencies, should there be a call in Corte Madera Creek or in the San Rafael area.

Fire Engineer Chris McKnight, who is one of the certified swimmers and boat operators, was available to answer any of the Director's questions. He simply stated the speed of the water crafts can reach up to 40mph, which could provide a prompt response to an emergency scene. He also explained that should the IRB need to be used to raft people to safety in shallow water, the motor could be position up and left unutilized.

 Workers' Compensation Claim Number 20005619 – Chief Pomi stated there was no current update and no action needed to be taken on item a.

NEW BUSINESS:

a. 2021 Kentfield Fire District Risk Control Report (Safety and Risk Control Review with FASIS) – Chief Pomi explained the District's Fire Agency Self-Insurance System (FASIS), serves as a risk control manager, helping guide the Fire District. They verify safety programs that are required throughout the state as well as Cal/OSHA compliance. FASIS also manages and controls the District's third party administrator, who handles all the workers' comp claims. Every 3 years Kentfield Fire District is required to meet with the FASIS team to review the District's safety programs and identify any deficiencies. On February 25, 2021, the District

went through an evaluation and the following areas were assessed: injury and illness prevention, training, pre-employment screening, respiratory protection, policies, procedures, bloodborne pathogen exposures, aerosol transmissible disease, wellness, alcohol and drug policies, standard operating procedures, workplace violence, etc. The 2021 report shows there are no deficiencies in the District's risk control programs. Captain Kris Viau, Kentfield Fire District's risk control officer, does a great job compiling documentation; Information is very well organized in binders and made available to staff and anyone who needs it for resource purposes. During the evaluation, Chief Pomi was able to provide the documentation to the FASIS team members and received an excellent rating, with no deficiencies as shown in the Safety and Risk Control Review.

The Board can form a subcommittee to meet with the association to discuss KAPF negotiations, and they can direct staff to prepare any documents or incremental worksheets.

Director Gerbsman requested Chief Pomi and Accountant Hom create a worksheet and present the figures for next fiscal year. He also recommended a Board subcommittee be formed again this year to meet with the association and relay negotiation communications back to the Board. Director Murray and Director Naso offered to be on the negotiation subcommittee. Captain Anthony Garcia and the association negotiation team will need to schedule a date and time with the Board subcommittee. The subcommittee will receive all information and will discuss at the appropriate board meeting, in a closed session. Captain Anthony Garcia stated the only change to the ground rules agreement is the date to represent the following year's MOU contract: 2021/2022.

The Board adjourned the Closed Session at 6:57 pm and entered back into Open Session.

CHIEF'S REPORT:

a. Changing the Monthly Board Meeting Schedule – Chief Pomi requested to change the monthly meeting schedule, from the third Wednesday of the month to the second Wednesday. The reason being, the third week of the month always consists of a number of other monthly meetings like the FAIRA Insurance and Fire Chief's meeting, and it becomes overwhelming at times. The Board has agreed to the request. Chief Pomi stated he would put together a formal request for the Board to approve at the April meeting.

DIRECTOR MATTERS: Directors provided the following information regarding their activities:

Director Naso reported there was a Marin Emergency Radio Authority meeting scheduled for March 24th and he would be attending. He stated there are a number of proposals in the works for MERA and a lot of work that included tower sights. The Marin IJ gave the Marin Emergency Radio Authority some good press a few weeks back for projects being set and ready for construction, which was great to see.

Director Evergettis announced the Marin Wildland Prevention Authority created a report to show where the tax dollar monies are being allocated. The following items were included in the report: Evacuation Studies \$120k, Chipper Program \$160k, Public Education \$250k, Local Agency payments \$2.1m, Personnel \$100k, Startup Costs \$200k, and Defensible Space Clearing \$2m; totaling \$6m. With a previous budget of \$8m, that leaves a surplus of \$2m which will be saved and rolled over to next year. Director Evergettis expressed his personal desire to see patch burning included in the allocation list in the future. The biggest subcontractor for the MWPA is FireSafe Marin who has cleared a lot of land through the Chipper Program. The next Marin Wildland Prevention Authority meeting is scheduled for March 18th and Director Evergettis will be attending.

Director Gerbsman expressed the need for the MWPA as an organization to be more proactive and clarify what they have accomplished, what they are doing, and what types of challenges they are facing. He feels there could be some strategic issues involved and hopes the monies stay within the agreement guidelines.



BACKGROUND:

On September 27, 2018, SB 1205 became effective, adding a new section to the California Health and Safety Code (HSC) which affects every fire department or fire district in the State. SB 1205 holds jurisdictional policy makers accountable to make progress on fire prevention resource requests, and ensures fire department funding allocations account for the long-standing needs of resource deficient fire prevention bureaus.

Existing California state law requires every fire department or district providing fire protection services to inspect every building used as a public or private school annually (HSC §13146.3). This same annual inspection requirement is applicable to hotels, motels, lodging houses, and apartment houses (HSC §13146.2). Currently, the Kentfield Fire Protection District is required by statute to annually inspect six (6) Group E occupancies, buildings, structures and/or facilities and twenty seven (27) Group R (and their associated sub-categories) occupancies.

REQUIREMENTS:

SB 1205 requires every fire department or district providing fire protection services to enforce building standards and other regulations adopted by the State Fire Marshal (SFM) to annually report to its administering authority their compliance with the annual inspection requirements of the California Health and Safety Code. The bill also requires the administering authority to formally acknowledge receipt of the compliance report in a resolution or a similar formal document. Kentfield Fire Protection District Resolution 1-2021 has been prepared to meet the requirements of SB1205.

SUMMARY:

SB1205 requires local fire departments and fire districts to annually report on its compliance with inspections currently mandated in statute. Specifically, this bill:

- 1) Requires every city, county or district fire department required to perform annual inspections (pursuant to HSC Sec. 13146.2 and 13146.3) to annually report to administrative authority on its compliance of said inspections.
- 2) Requires the report to occur when the administering authority discusses its annual budget, or at another time determined by the administering authority.
- 3) Requires the administering authority acknowledge receipt of the report in a resolution or a similar formal document.
- 4) Defines "administering authority" as a city council, county board of supervisors, or district board, as the case may be.

RESOLUTION NO. 1-2021

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF THE KENTFIELD FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT ACKNOWLEDGING RECEIPT OF A REPORT MADE BY THE FIRE CHIEF OF THE KENTFIELD FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT REGARDING THE INSPECTION OF CERTAIN OCCUPANCIES REQUIRED TO PERFORM ANNUAL INSPECTIONS IN SUCH OCCUPANCIES PURSUANT TO SECTIONS 13146.2 AND 13146.3 OF THE CALIFORNIA HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE.

WHEREAS, California Health & Safety Code Section 13146.4 was added in 2018, becoming effective on September 27, 2018; and,

WHEREAS, California Health & Safety Code Sections 13146.2 and 13146.3 requires all fire departments and Districts, including the Kentfield Fire Protection District, that provide fire protection services to perform annual inspections in every building used as a public or private school, hotel, motel, lodging house, apartment house, and certain residential care facilities for compliance with building standards, as provided and,

WHEREAS, California Health & Safety Code Section 13146.2 requires all fire departments all fire departments and Districts, including the Kentfield Fire Protection District, that provide fire protection services to report annually to its administering authority on its compliance with Sections 13146.2 and 13146.3 and,

WHEREAS, the Board of the Kentfield Fire Protection District intends this Resolution to fulfill the requirements of the California Health & Safety Code regarding acknowledgment of the Kentfield Fire Protection District's compliance with California Health and Sections 13146.2 and 13146.3.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of the Kentfield Fire Protection District that said Board expressly acknowledges the measure of compliance of the Kentfield Fire Protection District with California Health and Safety Code Sections 13146.2 and 13146.3 in the area encompassed by the Kentfield Fire Protection District, as follows:

A. EDUCATIONAL GROUP E OCCUPANCIES:

Educational Group E occupancies are generally those public and private schools, used by more than six persons at any one time for educational purposes through the 12th grade. Within the Kentfield Fire Protection District, there lie six (6) Group E occupancies, buildings, structures and/or facilities.

During calendar year 2020, the Kentfield Fire Protection District completed the annual inspection of six (6) Group E occupancies, buildings, structures and/or facilities. This is a compliance rate of 100 % for this reporting period.

B. RESIDENTIAL GROUP R OCCUPANCIES:

Residential Group R occupancies, for the purposes of this resolution, are generally those occupancies containing sleeping units, and include hotels, motels, apartments (three units or more), etc. as well as other residential occupancies (including a number of residential care facilities). These residential care facilities have a number of different sub-classifications, and they may contain residents or clients that have a range of needs, including those related to custodial care, mobility impairments, cognitive disabilities, etc. The residents may also be non-ambulatory or bedridden. Within the Kentfield Fire Protection District, there lie twenty seven (27) Group R (and their associated sub-categories) occupancies of this nature.

During calendar year 2020, the Kentfield Fire Protection District completed the annual inspection of twenty seven (27) Group R occupancies, buildings, structures and/or facilities. This is a compliance rate of 100 % for this reporting period.



California braces for extreme 2021 wildfire season - it's very dry out there

The chamise plants that blanket California's shrubby chaparral should have grown new sprouts by now, flowering after winter rains before baking in the arid summer heat.

They are highly flammable and abundant in wildland areas — and, for that reason, a bellwether to wildfire researchers. This month, a San Jose State University team analyzing moisture levels was shocked at what it found at study sites in the Santa Cruz Mountains. At two locations researchers found no new growth to cut from the shrubs. It's an ominous sign of just how dry the vegetation is around California, where boundless numbers of plants and trees have been starved of life-sustaining water thanks to an entire winter of paltry precipitation. Those dry plants are fuel for wildfires, and they're primed to burn explosively.




Craig Clements, director of San Jose State's Fire Weather Research Laboratory, said it was the first time he had ever found no new chamise growth to study. The plants are about as dry as they would normally be a few months from now, he said.

"The chamise was really, really problematic," Clements recalled. "They're not bringing enough soil moisture up into their woody stems to grow. They're remaining somewhat dormant." To him, the implications are clear. "We could have more intense fires earlier in the season, is what it suggests," Clements said.


California is barreling toward its driest and most fire-prone months, with many locations around the Bay Area and Central Coast having seen about 50% or less of their average precipitation levels for this time of year. And the time for improvement is rapidly ending, as the state's Mediterranean climate leaves essentially zero room for any substantial amount of rain or snow once April ends.

All but a small slice in the state's northwest is in some level of drought or, at a minimum, abnormally dry, according to the U.S. Drought Monitor. The parched conditions result from two consecutive winters of abysmal precipitation. State officials have already warned of water supply shortages and pleaded with the public to conserve. At last one Bay Area water district is considering imposing restrictions.



The persistent dryness has already provided ample room for unusual fire activity. A spate of small fires started around Northern California in January, when Pacific Gas and Electric Co. also initiated its first-ever wintertime power shut-offs to prevent blazes. From the start of the year through April 4, firefighters in the state have fought 995 fires that burned 3,007 acres — a huge increase from the 697 fires that burned 1,266 acres in the same time period last year.

It's the opposite of where the state's fire-weary residents would like to be after the unceasing flames that burned last summer and fall, at one point turning the Bay Area skies deep orange because so much smoke had blocked the sun. A record 4.2 million acres burned in California in 2020.



April's outlook suggests little reprieve is in store during the warmer months ahead.

"It's extraordinary that there's any fire risk in a lot of California right now, and yet here we are," said UCLA climate scientist Daniel Swain. "Normally, this would be the least flammable time of year throughout most of California."

Swain said the 2021 fire season is unlikely to surpass the severity of 2020, given the particularly unlucky combination of factors — little rain, a freak August lightning storm and unrelenting autumn winds — that made last year so bad.

"It was just such an extreme, anomalous outlier," he said. "I think it's statistically unlikely that we achieve that level, partly because it took a bunch of things coming together in the worst possible way."

Scientists broadly agree that climate change is elevating California's wildfire risks, as rising temperatures dry out vegetation and shift precipitation patterns. Of particular concern to Swain is recent research showing how California's wet season is starting later, thereby extending the tail end of peak fire season.

In a <u>February commentary in Geophysical Research Letters</u>, Swain wrote that the "growing correspondence" between the projections of climate models and actual precipitation in California "increasingly suggests these trends are unlikely to have arisen by random chance, and will likely continue in the future with further climate warming."

Swain said he's not yet worried about the intensity of wildfires over the next two months or so, but starting around mid-July, the risk of extreme fire behavior could escalate. The threat could be compounded if autumn rains are again delayed into November or even December — especially when fast, dry winds blow from the northeast. Those conditions have given rise to some of California's worst wildfires, including the November 2018 Camp Fire that virtually leveled the town of Paradise in Butte County.

In the Santa Cruz Mountains, the 2020 fire season never truly ended. The area was hit hard in August by the 86,000-acre CZU Lightning Complex fires, which killed one person and destroyed about 1,000 homes in Santa Cruz and San Mateo counties. Some of the anomalous January fires were within the footprint of the CZU burn scar, suggesting that winds whipped up embers that had smoldered into winter.

Another "sleeper spot" in the CZU burn scar was responsible for one of five fires extinguished by Cal Fire since the end of March. Several others were started by escaped controlled burn piles, officials said. Some required aircraft to suppress — a step not normally needed until June.

Though the blazes burned just a handful of acres, the fact they were able to gain any traction at all alarmed firefighters, who have now sped up their seasonal staffing increases.

"With the lack of precipitation, it's very concerning," said Ian Larkin, unit chief of Cal Fire's San Mateo-Santa Cruz Unit. "We are a month ahead of schedule on our staffing."

The state government has tried to get ahead of the looming threat by adding 1,400 firefighters and unveiling a \$536 million plan to fund vegetation thinning, forest health initiatives, grants to make homes fire resistant and other measures.

Speaking about the plan on Thursday at Fresno County's Shaver Lake, where the monstrous Creek Fire ignited in September, state Natural Resources Agency Director Wade Crowfoot said, "We are just getting out of our second consecutive dry winter, and what we can expect this summer in wildfire conditions is more of the same."

That's an unsettling reality for parts of the state that have been repeatedly battered by fires in recent years. One of them is Sonoma County, which was hit by major wildfires in 2017, 2019 and 2020. Santa Rosa, the county's largest city, had by early April recorded just 40% of its average rainfall for this time of year.

Another indication of the widespread dryness: County water managers said reservoir capacities are lower than they were at the height of the last drought.

"The general trend is, nothing is looking good," said Marshall Turbeville, chief of the Northern Sonoma County Fire Protection District.

Turbeville said his greatest concern is forested areas, even though some of them just burned last year during the Walbridge Fire, which made up the west portion of the North Bay's gargantuan LNU Lightning Complex.

"It's gonna be the conifers, where those big logs are just not having the opportunity to accrue the wintertime moisture," he said. "I'm really worried about forest fires."

But the year's wildfire outlook is embedded with uncertainty. Dryness and heat aside, all wildfires need a spark, often caused by a human. No one can predict if and when the sparks will occur. In any case, Swain, the UCLA climate scientist, said the state will hopefully not endure an extremely rare dry lightning siege two years in a row, which would eliminate nature's most menacing ignition source.

Perhaps the greatest unknown is the force behind the deadliest of recent fiery catastrophes: the powerful gusts that propelled flames into places such as Santa Rosa and Paradise. Their frequency and severity are impossible to ascertain several months in advance. As always, the wind will be the wild card.

MERA Newsletter

MERA released a newsletter publication in early March 2021 notifying members and stakeholders of the most current MERA news. Topics included the award process of Bid Package #1, Next Gen Project schedule highlights, the status of the equipment upgrade being provided by the Assistance to Firefighters Grant, and an informational section featuring the Next Gen Master Site.

Senior Parcel Tax Exemption

In 2014 Marin County voters approved the parcel tax measure, Measure A, to provide funding for the upgrade to the MERA Next Gen System. Included in this measure is the ability for qualified low-income senior homeowners to apply for an exemption to this tax. Applications for exemption must be completed annually, so any residents that have applied previously must apply again this year. The application deadline is June 1, 2021. MERA has initiated an outreach campaign, working with local media to notify the public of the exemption and application deadline. Media outlets were contacted beginning in early March and will continue through April and May of 2021.

Dear Mr.'s Lichten, Rokeach & Beauduy,

We are writing to you today with regards to the public comment period related to the current Municipal Regional Stormwater NPDES Permit regulations that are currently under review and modification.

We have had the opportunity to review the current draft language, along with the comments that have been submitted by the Alameda County Fire Department and Oakland Fire Department. We are in full agreement with the concerns and comments submitted by both agencies.

The previous permit had passing language about using BMPs when possible, during firefighting operations. The new proposed permit has a whole section on firefighting discharges. This new proposed firefighting section includes the following requirements:

- Catalog BMPs and SOPs to contain and cleanup firefighting water and foam,
- Catalog and assess how firefighting water and foam is impacting waterbodies,
- Reporting requirements to list the above items,
- Switch to less toxic foams and develop BMPs to reduce foam impacts,
- Assess coordination with large industrial sites re: firefighting runoff from their facilities,
- Training for staff that contain and cleanup firefighting runoff,
- Train contractors hired for firefighting cleanup,
- Regional coordination to evaluate opportunities to reduce the impacts of emergency discharges,
- Report whenever 5 gal of foam or more is used.

Our general concerns are as follows:

- Emergency firefighting discharges are generally exempt from water quality regulation. The current draft language would result in significant impacts to emergency firefighting operations, as well as our currently strained budgets.
- We submit there is opportunity to collaborate to improve water quality. Fire agencies and others are voluntarily getting rid of fluorinated foam and moving to more environmentally considerate alternatives is a great example. There are non-emergency operations that could also be improved. We request the Board partner with fire agencies to identify these approaches and collaboratively work to integrate these into BMP's.

We respectfully request that you add this letter to the public comments for the proposed changes as part of the Municipal Regional Stormwater NPDES Permit regulations that are currently under review and modification. Furthermore, we respectfully ask that you consider amending the current draft language to reflect the comments that have been submitted by the Alameda County Fire Department and Oakland Fire Department.

Dear Dave: Sadly I have just learned that Bob Beedle, the last San Anselmo Fire Dept Chief and the first Ross Valley Fire Chief, passed away yesterday at 9:30 AM of cardiac arrest. He died on April 8 - two days short of his 67th wedding anniversary and 16 days short of his 87th birthday. The Beedle Family requested that I contact the Town and the old firefighters to inform them of his death. Bob Lived in San Anselmo most of his life and worked up the ranks until he was promoted to chief in 1976. He retired in 1986 with over 30 years in the service of San Anselmo. His father, Charlie Beedle, was a devoted employee of San Anselmo (street Department) for many years. Bob was a very dear friend of mine and I had the pleasure to work with him during the late 60's and early 70's at the old fire station (Station #1 the tower is still there) before the new station was constructed at it's present location. In fact, in 1972, I took the fire exam and was offered a permanent job as a fire fighter by the then Chief, Dick McLaren. I turned downed the position and embarked teaching career of 34 years (Marin Catholic - 21 years and then Alameda School District for 13 years as a Teacher of the Visually Impaired). Both my father and Bob were instrumental in me making this difficult decision - a decision I never have regretted. The old time firefighters were a close lot. It was a real brotherhood and not only did we work together but we did so many things off duty together. In those days because firemen were required to live within the town, and we were always there to lend a hand to one another. We supported each other in both times of happiness and sadness. It was a real bond of camaraderie and true friendship. When I was discharged in 1969 from the Army after 3 years of service (which included 15 months in Vietnam), my wife and I returned to San Anselmo and rented an apartment at 43B cedar street for about nine months. We then purchased a small ramshackle "creek" house at 4 Glen Road. Bob and his friend Don Whitney, the two biggest and strongest firemen in the Department, moved all of our furniture (and there were several extremely heavy pieces) to our new home of 800 square feet. They both did moving jobs on their day off. No questions asked, they worked the entire day, hauling very large pieces of furniture up and down stairs when such ease and much laughter. For payment, two beers each! Bob and I were always there for each other - In 1986, Bob was a pall-bearer at my dad's funeral (Frank Sousa- former fire chief of San Anselmo); and he and his wife Edna were there for us when our son, Tom passed away of Polycystic Kidney disease in 2014. He was indeed a true and loyal friend to many and touched so many lives. He was nine years my senior and my mentor while I worked Summer and vacation relief shifts at the fire department. But more than ever, he was a true friend. A person that you may not see for several years, but is always ready to give you advice and support - someone that you can trust, that you are able to confide in; someone that you can always count on. Upon retirement Bob and Edna, moved to Occidental, where Bob's family had settled in the 1870's. But the fire service was always in Bob's heart, and he and Edna often returned to Marin to stay at the Embassy Suites for several weeks at a time. Since Edna was in a wheel chair. Bob would take her around San Anselmo and other places, and she would get her hair styled from my cousin, Julie Sousa. While Edna was with Julie, Bob and I would often catch up with a cup of coffee somewhere in San Anselmo. When Bob turn 80 his health began to decline but always kept that positive attitude, passion for the department, and that warm Beedle smile. He never complained even when tragedy struck in Sept of 2019. While in Marin, Bob learned that his home in Occidental caught fire, burned to the ground with contents almost a total loss. (I have attached two photos, one showing Bob surveying the remains of his of his house, and the other showing all that was recovered from the fire. They lost almost everything. But Bob remained strong in the face of this adversity. Since most of the old timers are gone, not many young people recall men like Chief Charlie Cartwright (first paid chief of San Anselmo); Nello Marcucci - longest serving chief in the San Anselmo with forty years of service (he was responsible for the construction of the then new fire station #2 (now Station 20 on Buttterfield Road; my father, Frank Sousa, who devoted 34 years to the department. A bronze plaque can be seen on the front wall of Station19 (San Anselmo Avenue) honoring him; Dick McLaren, 4th chief of the department who joined the department after WWII (returning a hero) and retired in 1976; and again. Bob, who was the transition chief from San Anselmo Fire Department to Ross Valley Fire Department. I probably have rambled on long enough but I just want to let the Town know that we have lost another oldtimer who faithfully and selfishly devoted themselves to the protection of the Town of San Anselmo. Yesterday, I sent an email to the "Old Geezer Group" (a group of San Anselmo and Ross Valley retired firefighters who meet every other month for lunch, announcing Bob's passing. Here are a few of the responses I have received: "Bob was a good man, a good friend and one hell of a firefighter. I feel privileged to have experienced all

"I had the ultimate respect for Bob as my first Captain. He was a huge part of the RVFD. He'll be sorely missed. RIP Bob!"

" Sad news indeed, he was not only an example and teacher to me when I started my courses, I remember he was also good friends with my parents, R.I.P. Bob."

In closing, I would like to ask the the town consider flying the flag at half staff at Town Hall and all the 4 fire stations of the Ross Valley Fire Department. This is a simple request to honor such a man. I sorely miss my friend; my mentor; and, to me, the older brother I never had. Thank you for listening to an old-timer ramble.


