RESOLUTION NO. 3-2022

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE KENTFIELD FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT PROCLAIMING A LOCAL EMERGENCY, RATIFYING THE PROCLAMATION OF A STATE OF EMERGENCY BY EXECUTIVE ORDER N-08-21, DATED JUNE 11, 2021, AND AUTHORIZING REMOTE TELECONFERENCE MEETINGS OF THE LEGISLATIVE BODIES OF THE KENTFIELD FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT FOR THE PERIOD MARCH 9, 2022 – APRIL 9, 2022, PURSUANT TO BROWN ACT PROVISIONS.

WHEREAS, the KENTFIELD FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT is committed to preserving and nurturing public access and participation in meetings of the Board of Directors; and

WHEREAS, all meetings of KENTFIELD FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT's legislative bodies are open and public, as required by the Ralph M. Brown Act (Cal. Gov. Code 54950 – 54963), so that any member of the public may attend, participate, and watch the District legislative bodies conduct their business; and

WHEREAS, the Brown Act, Government Code section 54953(e), makes provisions for remote teleconferencing participation in meetings by members of a legislative body, without compliance with the requirements of Government Code section 54953(b)(3), subject to the existence of certain conditions; and

WHEREAS, a required condition is that a state of emergency is declared by the Governor pursuant to Government Code section 8625, proclaiming the existence of conditions of disaster or of extreme peril to the safety of persons and property within the state caused by conditions as described in Government Code section 8558; and

WHEREAS, it is further required that state or local officials have imposed or recommended measures to promote social distancing, or, the legislative body meeting in person would present imminent risks to the health and safety of attendees; and

WHEREAS, such conditions now exist in the District, specifically the surge of Covid-19 cases related to the Delta Variant; and

WHEREAS, AB 361 allows for the continuation of teleconferenced meetings to ensure social distancing, which will avoid the potential spread of the Delta Variant among the unvaccinated and the vaccinated; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Directors does hereby find social distancing continues to be recommended by the Centers for Disease Control and Marin County Public Health Officers; and

WHEREAS, the District will continue to use a Zoom platform, which does not require registrations, provides a non-internet telephone only option, and has proven over the past 24 months to adequately allow for public participation and comment, to provide free access to the Board of Director meetings,

NOW, THEREFORE, THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF KENTFIELD FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT DOES HEREBY RESOLVE AS FOLLOWS:

Recitals. The Recitals set forth above are true and correct and are incorporated into the Resolution by this reference.

<u>Proclamation of Local Emergency</u>. The Board hereby proclaims that it has considered the state of emergency, and finds that a local emergency now exists, and Marin County Health officers continue to recommend social distancing and avoidance of in person meetings.

<u>Ratification of Governor's Proclamation of a State of Emergency</u>. The Board hereby ratifies the Governor of the State of California's Proclamation of State of Emergency, effective as of its issuance date of June 11, 2021.

Remote Teleconference Meetings. The Fire Chief and legislative bodies of KENTFIELD FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT are hereby authorized and directed to take all actions necessary to carry out the intent and purpose of this Resolution including, conducting open and public meetings in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e) and other applicable provisions of the Brown Act.

Effective Date of Resolution. This Resolution shall take effect immediately upon its adoption and shall be effective until April 13, 2022, or such time the Board of Directors adopts a subsequent resolution in accordance with Government Code section 54953(e)(3) to extend the time during which the legislative bodies of KENTFIELD FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT may continue to teleconference.

DATE: Wednesday, February 9, 2022

CALL TO ORDER: 6:30 p.m. by Chairman Naso. Director Corbet led the assembly in the Pledge of Allegiance.

ROLL CALL: Corbet-present; Evergettis-present; Gerbsman-absent; Murray-present; Naso-present. Also in attendance were Chief Pomi, Accountant Hom, Deputy Fire Marshal Pasero, Battalion Chief Glenn, C-Shift, and Recording Secretary Wilson.

VOTE TO CONTINUE VIRTUAL MEETINGS AB 361 – Chief Pomi explained the Brown Act states a resolution needs to be discussed and approved every 30 days in order to meet remotely. Kentfield Fire District utilizes the Zoom platform for all Board of Director Meetings. Chief Pomi recommended the Board approve Resolution 2-2022.

Director Murray inquired about the return of in-person meetings. He asked Chief Pomi for his opinion and if there was any possibility of holding an in-person Board of Directors meeting for the month of April. Chief Pomi replied and stated he must continue to follow the Marin County Public Health Order, the Centers for Disease Control recommendations, and the guide lines within the State of Emergency by Executive Order N-08-21. He recognized Director Murray's interest on returning to in-person but explained there is a lot of work involved in order to return. Since this is a public meeting, the District would need to provide public access. With that, it would mean implementing masking, social distancing, along with vaccine and booster tracking. Chief Pomi said he would do all he could to return to in-person meetings, but for now this was the safest for all. Director Murray understood and expressed that he hadn't thought about all the implementations and requirements for the public to be able to attend as well.

SPECIAL ANNOUNCEMENTS/PRESENTATIONS:

a. 2021 KFD Fire Prevention Presentation – Deputy Fire Marshal Pasero provided a PowerPoint presentation on the accomplishments of the fire prevention division that took place this past calendar year. The Board packet consisted of two documents from DFM Pasero: an annual report on statistical data and the PowerPoint slides to help follow along his presentation. DFM Pasero reflected on the District's mission statement and stated Kentfield Fire Protection District exists to care for, protect, and serve our communities. The need for prevention and an inspection model is also reflected in the core principles which explains that KFD is committed to the protection of life, property, and the environment. The District believes that its communities are the reason for its existence.

To be collaborative throughout the County, Kentfield Fire District participates in a number of different organizations and groups. Making sure the District has a voice and input in how the future of Marin County's fire prevention is crafted and maintained, is imperative. DFM Pasero itemized a list of things the District has historically been a part of and will continue through. He said a majority of what he does includes the review and inspection of construction projects and fire protection systems. In 2021, there was a slight reduction in permits issued and some of that has been absorbed through a new county online permitting process. Alternate power systems such as battery systems, generators, and roof mounted solar systems have increased in the community however. DFM Pasero explained it is important to review these type of additions because they impact our first responder's ability to deliver fire suppression. For the community, review and inspections are critical to ensure installations are within code compliance.

The defensible space inspections and home hardening program continues to grow and improve. Seasonal inspectors, specific to our jurisdiction in Kentfield and Greenbrae performed a total 1911 inspections; the most completed in one calendar year. DFM Pasero stated this gives Kentfield Fire District the opportunity to get out and really engage with the public on important topics.

The Marin County Fire investigation team is supported by all member agencies throughout the County and Kentfield Fire District is most certainly a part of that. This team provides coverage after hours and DFM Pasero completes a week long shift, six times a year. This past year, he attended ten investigations. The team continues to develop, engage, and build on its program with other community agencies in order to provide excellent investigation services.

As discussed at numerous other Board meetings, this past year KFD was able to utilize MWPA funds for six primary projects. These consisted of removing vegetation and tree hazards, along with roadside clearance. With all this work finalized, better access roads for our firefighters have been created. Our seasonal inspectors were able perform annual maintenance and service on 272 fire hydrants within the district; there are about 365 hydrants total. It is important to make sure hydrants are operational in the event of an emergency. The record keeping process for each in-service and out-of-service hydrant is evolving and improving as well.

DFM Pasero explained the difficulty in identifying and calculating how many times the District worked or interacted with the community in defense of fire prevention and life safety. The aggregate of all the numbers that have been shown in this presentation equates to 2855 actions in 2021. That is a substantial number of times to interface in the community either through a construction project, an investigation, an inspection, or any type of outreach performed. DFM Pasero concluded by saying his goal is to improve that metric number every year.

Director Murray thanked Deputy Fire Marshal Pasero for the presentation and expressed how fortunate the KFD community is to have Larry as their prevention officer. Chief Pomi agreed and directed all to the front page of the *Fire Prevention Annual Report*, under the 'professional participation' section. He pointed out Deputy Fire Marshal Pasero's participation in all the county/regional groups listed such as: President of the MCFIT team, Vice President of the prevention officers, MWPA technical advisory committee, teacher for the D-Space academy, developer of the D-Space program, and manager of the vegetation protects. Chief Pomi thanked Deputy Fire Marshal Pasero for going above and beyond for Kentfield Fire Protection District.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS:

a. Firefighter Interview Results/Selection - Appointment of Full-Time Firefighter – The District has identified the need to fill a permanent firefighter position. Chief Pomi explained that with the retirement of Engineer Anthony Johnston last year, a vacancy was created for one full-time position. The District conducted a comprehensive process that included an application review, a panel assessment, and a Chief's interview. The information was brought to the Board's attention last month and the District was directed to proceed in moving forward. A background investigation and a medical assessment were then completed. Chief Pomi recommended candidate Michael A. Gutierrez be appointed as the new firefighter for Kentfield Fire Protection District. He described Michael Gutierrez as the highest ranking candidate on

the list, with many years of experience in Marin. Michael Gutierrez will add a tremendous amount of knowledge and support to station 17. Chief Pomi requested an action to approve Michael A. Gutierrez as a step II firefighter within the KAPF MOU.

M/S Evergettis/Murray to appointment Michael A. Gutierrez as the new firefighter for Kentfield Fire Protection District

NEW BUSINESS:

a. Assigned and Unassigned Fund Balances Ending F/Y 20-21 — Chief Pomi presented the current reserve allocations and fund balances, totaling \$5,965,203. During the 20/21 F/Y end audit, Maze & Associates identified the District had \$ 2,710,338 in unassigned funds as of June 30, 2021. Chief Pomi felt it would be best to allocate some those unassigned funds and referenced the Recommendations for Consideration worksheet he provided in the Board packet. He recommended the following re-allocations:

Category 6910/Apparatus Replacement – Allocate \$600k into this account for a total of \$1,925,572 to cover the remaining portion of the Type III Fire Engine purchase. Once the Type III is paid off, about \$1.6m will remain in that account. This will provide an opportunity to replace Truck 17 in the near future.

Category 6915/Building Replacement/Renovation – Several years ago we started funding this assigned account just in case we needed to replace the HVAC system and/or the roof. Allocating \$200k into this category would increase the fund balance from \$747,899 to \$947,899.

Category 6920/ Compensation Absences – Unused time off, such as vacation and comp time, are reported as a liability in our financial statements. For security purposes and in the event that the District needs to pay an employee out for a time off, the requested amount to move to this account is \$100k; increasing the fund balance from \$180,973 to \$280,973.

Category 6950/General Insurance Deductible – Allocate an additional \$10k to this category due to increases in insurance premiums; increasing the fund balance from \$20,000 to \$30,000.

Category 6970/Heavy Rescue Equipment – Allocate \$100k to this account to replace any equipment that is worn down; increasing the fund balance from \$80,000 to \$180,000.

Category 6975/ Debt Service Sinking Fund – Originally established as a saving account to help with debt service, the debt due is about \$400k. Since the monies in this account are no longer necessary, the request is to transfer \$180k from this account into Category 6945/SCBA Replacement Fund; decreasing the Category 6975 fund balance from \$675,000 to \$445,000.

Category 6945/SCBA Replacement – With the transfer from Category 6975, this fund will now have a balance of \$180,000; increasing from \$0 to \$180,000.

Chief Pomi conveyed to the Board that all these funds, whether they are assigned or unassigned, can be moved by an action item at a Board meeting. Assigning funds to a specific account is simply for the District's planning purposes.

Administrative Assistant Wilson announced these forms are available for each filer to review and sign at the District office. She would be happy to assist or answer any questions.

CHIEF'S REPORT:

- a. **Seasonal Firefighter Recruitment 2022** The recruitment for seasonal firefighters is open now until February 25th. The hiring flyer is available in the packet for distribution to the public.
- b. Composite Photo of KFD membership Professional photos for the 100th year centennial celebration were taken in January. Battalion Chief Glenn will continue to schedule those members who haven't taken their picture yet.
- c. Insurance renewals Increasing requirements on the insurance renewals.
- d. FY 22/23 Budget planning The month of March will begin the Fiscal Year 2022/23 Budget planning process.
- e. *Training* The KFD firefighters have been doing a lot of training these past couple of weeks. This includes EMT, EMS Policy and Procedure, USAR, and Rope Rescue training.
- f. Covid-19 Vaccinations/Boosters Marin County is lifting the mask mandate indoors for those who are fully vaccinated. Marin County has push out a new order mandating that all first responders be fully vaccinated and boosted. Come April 15th, if you are not fully vaccinated and boosted you can no longer work in the public sector. At the March BOD meeting, there will be a closed session to discuss what these implications could mean for the County as a whole.
- g. *Fire Foundry Program* A two page synopsis of what is going on with the fire foundry program is included in the BOD packet. The fire foundry is located at the old San Rafael station 53, which has been remodeled. There are currently twelve individuals assigned to the fire foundry who are living there and doing vegetation management work around the County. These individuals are also working with the College of Marin and getting school credit, all while getting paid. It is a great program.
- h. *Crab Feed Installation Dinner* Cancellation notice for the Crab Feed, once again this year due to Covid-19.

DIRECTOR MATTERS: Directors provided the following information regarding their activities:

Director Evergettis – Reported on the MWPA and its growth in employment. They have approved hiring an administrative analysist, who will work beside Mark Brown, as well as a grant specialist, two vegetation management specialists, and an environmental lawyer.

CORRESPONDENCE: Were reviewed.

DISTRICT OPERATIONS: January Incident Logs and Overtime Reports were reviewed.



Marin County Radio Authority (MERA) Measure A Parcel Tax Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) – 2022-23 Tax Year

ACCESS THE LOW-INCOME SENIOR EXEMPTION APPLICATION

(APPLICATION FILING DEADLINE - on or before - JUNE 1, 2022

Who is eligible to receive a Low-Income Senior Exemption for the Measure A Parcel Tax for the 2022-2023 tax year?

To qualify for a Low-Income Senior Exemption for the Measure A parcel tax for a single-family residence, you must (1) be 65 years of age or older by December 31, 2022, (2) own and occupy your residence, and (3) not have earned a total annual household income of more than \$102,450 in 2021.

What is the deadline to file a Low-Income Senior Exemption application for the 2022-2023 tax year?

The deadline to file a Low-Income Senior Exemption application for the 2022-2023 tax year is June 1, 2022.

APPLICATIONS MAILED, FAXED, EMAILED OR HAND-DELIVERED TO MERA AT THE NOVATO FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT WILL NOT BE ACCEPTED

Do I need to submit a Low-Income Senior Exemption application every year?

Yes. Because the exemption is based upon income, and income may change from year-to-year, you will need to file a Low-Income Senior Exemption application every year.

Where does the money go?

The parcel taxes will be used to replace Marin County's aging emergency communications system; reduce 911 response times, improve communications reliability during earthquakes, floods, fires, and other disasters; and ensure reliable communications among police, fire, and paramedic first responders throughout Marin County.

For how many years has the parcel tax been authorized?

The Measure A parcel tax has a term of 20 years, commencing in the 2015-2016 tax year. The final levy for the Measure A parcel tax will be for the 2034-2035 tax year.

Who voted for this parcel tax?

The Measure A parcel tax was put before the registered voters of Marin County as a General Election ballot measure on November 4, 2014. The measure passed with 67.14% approval.

I occupy multiple residences which are located on different parcels. Can I receive an exemption for all of them?

No. You may only claim **ONE** parcel as your primary residence.

I sent in the Low-Income Senior Exemption application before June 1st. Why is the charge for the Measure A parcel tax is still on my property tax bill?

If you are able to provide evidence that you submitted a Low-Income Senior Exemption application prior to June 1st (e.g. certified mail receipt, fax confirmation, receipt from our office of hand-delivery, etc.), please provide a copy of such evidence to us. We will investigate on a case-by-case situation to verify your submission of a Low-Income Senior Exemption application.

Every four years, the citizens who reside within the member communities of the RVPA service area vote to fund the tax for a four-year period. The current tax expires on June 30, 2023. In order to maintain this revenue stream, each JPA member agency must place the matter on a ballot. The purpose of the attached report is intended to fulfill the member agency's obligation to place this matter on the June 2022 ballot.

Renewal of the Ross Valley Paramedic Authority four-year tax for FY 23/24 thru FY 26/27

SUBJECT

Consider approval of the resolution calling and giving notice of the holding of an election to be held on June 7, 2022 and requesting the Board of Supervisors of the County of Marin to Consolidate said election.

SUMMARY

The RVPA is an 8-member joint powers authority (JPA) that was established in 1982 for delivering Fire Department paramedic services in the Ross Valley region. The primary funding mechanism for the RVPA is a property tax. Each taxable residential unit is taxed along with every 1,500 square feet of non-residential structure. This taxation-funding source has been in place since the inception of the RVPA. It financially supports a significant portion of the approximately \$2.8 million dollar annual budget.

BACKGROUND

The 8-member communities of the RVPA consist of:

- Corte Madera*
- Larkspur
- Kentfield
- Ross
- San Anselmo
- Sleepy Hollow
- Fairfax
- Unincorporated areas (CSA 27) in the Ross Valley area

The RVPA JPA is one of the oldest and most successful regional partnerships in Marin County. The JPA established in 1982 was a way to share costs among the member agencies in order to provide Fire Department based paramedic first response and ambulance transport services to the communities in the Ross Valley. Since its launch, the JPA has evolved to provide exceptional levels of advanced life support care to our residents and visitors.

DISCUSSION

In November 2018, the RVPA proposed and the voters in all member agencies (excluding Corte Madera*) approved the current tax that begins at \$79 plus a 50-cent administrative fee paid to the county, and incrementally increases each year by \$4. In the fourth year (2022-23), the tax will top out at \$91 and the 50-cent administrative fee paid to the county tax collector.

For the next four years, the RVPA Board of Directors has approved a tax rate containing \$3 annual increases as follows:

2023-24	\$94.50
2024-25	\$97.50
2025-26	\$100.50
2026-27	\$103.50

^{*} Corte Madera is a sub-contractor of the RVPA and sets tax rates that are separate from the other member agency areas.

The RVPA Board has approved the following ballot language and ballot argument for use by the member agencies:

To maintain rapid 9-1-1 emergency response times and preserve the number of on-duty paramedics ready to respond to accidents/ medical emergencies, shall the Ross Valley Paramedic Authority measure be adopted continuing for four years the paramedic services special tax of \$94.50 per residential living unit or 1,500 square feet of developed nonresidential property, adjusted up to \$3 per year, generating approximately \$265,500 annually, subject to annual audits, public spending disclosure and all funds for local paramedic services?

BALLOT ARGUMENT

Since 1982, the voters of the Ross Valley have continued to approve a special tax to help fund the fire department based paramedic service. You are being asked to again support the tax with modest annual \$4 incremental increases for four years to a maximum rate of \$91.50. The Ross Valley Paramedic Authority is a partnership of 8 Ross Valley communities that have combined efforts to deliver this exceptional level of care.

The initial Ross Valley Paramedic Authority tax provided for a single ambulance. The expectation for paramedic care from our citizens has dictated that service levels continue to expand and evolve. Paramedic care is now provided through a system that includes, state of the art fire department paramedic ambulance units and with trained paramedics aboard fire engines so that advanced emergency care can arrive as quickly as possible.

The Ross Valley Paramedic Authority will continue the responsible, transparent approach to managing the costs of our emergency medical response service and adequately provide for the long-term safety of our community.

A Yes Vote Will:

- Ensure the existing high-level paramedic emergency medical response services
- Continue local control over these tax revenues
- Maintain rapid emergency medical response

Your tax pays for a significant portion of the paramedic program. Additional funds are collected from insurance companies through third party billing and from billing of nonresident customers. 

New Vaccination Mandate for First Responders Marin issues order directed to law enforcement, firefighters, medical personnel

San Rafael, CA – Marin County personnel in the fields of law enforcement, firefighting, and emergency medical response must be fully vaccinated and boosted to work in Marin County's higher-risk settings, according to a new Marin County <u>health order</u> taking effect at 12:01 a.m. on February 10.

Unvaccinated first responders will need to receive their first dose of the <u>COVID vaccine</u> by March 1 and complete their primary series no later than April 15. In addition, personnel will need to be up-to-date with a booster shot within 15 days of becoming booster-eligible to continue working in higher-risk settings and interact with the public. Starting April 15, unvaccinated or unboosted first responders will be prohibited from entering higher-risk settings or interacting with the public in the course of their work unless they have a qualifying exemption. First

responders without a medical or religious exemption can no longer "test out" of vaccination requirements.

Recent COVID-19 outbreaks have been traced to unvaccinated first responders, according to Marin County Public Health records. As of February 7, Marin County Public Health was managing multiple, preventable outbreaks in vulnerable, higher-risk settings. Those settings include those in which the first responders work with people who are at higher risk of severe illness, hospitalization, or death from COVID-19, including congregate settings. Among active outbreaks countywide, there is one at the Marin County Jail, nine at skilled nursing facilities ("nursing homes"), nine at residential care facilities for the elderly, and 19 at other group living facilities.

"These outbreaks have been amplified by contact with unboosted staff, an inadequate testing cadence, and a highly contagious variant," said Dr. Lisa Santora, the County's Deputy Public Health Officer. "It is critical to protect our public safety and health care systems from the Omicron variant as well as future waves of COVID-19 activity."

First responders included in <u>the Public Health order</u> include police officers, Sheriff's deputies, probation officers, part-time and full-time firefighters, and emergency medical services (EMS) personnel, and those providing pre-hospital medical care. The order also applies to first responders who routinely interact with the public.

Marin has one of the highest <u>COVID-19</u> vaccination rates of any county in the nation with 90.7% of those aged 5 and over having completed a vaccine series.

"While highly vaccinated, Marin County is experiencing waning community immunity," added Santora. "It has been more than one year since many first responders completed their primary COVID-19 vaccine series."

Evidence indicates that the Omicron variant is significantly more transmissible than prior virus variants and that individuals who have had only their initial vaccine series and are eligible for the booster are susceptible to the Omicron variant.

Santora said it's critical to ensure all individuals working in higher-risk settings are both vaccinated and boosted when eligible. Protecting frontline workers from infection is essential to staffing our critical infrastructure, including public safety and health care systems. Individuals working in higher-risk settings can also expose highly vulnerable individuals who are at increased risk of severe illness and death.

For the time being, workers in those first-responder roles who are not fully vaccinated or not up-to-date with a booster must comply with the following if they have not tested positive for COVID-19 in past 90 days:

- use a fit-tested N95 <u>mask</u> at all times when around other people, except when eating, bathing, or sleeping; and,
- undergo twice weekly testing; and,
- when practicable, avoid using indoor breakrooms or cafeterias and avoid eating indoors or sleeping indoors when others are present.

Marin supervisors advance Project Homekey housing in Larkspur

A project to house 43 to 50 chronically homeless people in a former skilled nursing center in Larkspur moved forward Tuesday, despite stiff opposition from neighbors.

After listening to more than 100 people comment over several hours, the supervisors voted unanimously to accept a \$15.49 million state Project Homekey grant to help fund the project.

The project, which will be located at 1251 South Eliseo Drive, has left many residents furious with Supervisor Katie Rice, whose district encompasses the area. Parents with young children in particular have raised safety concerns.

"I oppose this project, and I oppose you, Katie Rice," said Alexandra Buldrini, one of many people to comment. "If you approve this I'm going to start a recall." Buldrini was one of several project opponents to threaten Rice with a recall during Tuesday's meeting.

"I am hearing loud and clear folks' concerns," Rice said. "You can do with me what you want, but while I'm in office I'm going to be working as hard as I can to make this a success."

The housing project will dovetail with the county's "housing first" strategy of addressing homelessness. The strategy focuses on getting the chronically homeless — people who have been homeless for at least one year and have a physical, mental or addiction-related disability — housed with supportive services.

To be eligible for housing at the Larkspur project, residents will have to meet this definition of chronic homelessness. Since 2017, the county has housed over 440 chronically homeless residents following this strategy and using federal housing vouchers.

"There are a lot of single adults who are sleeping unsheltered in our county every night. It's a tremendous need," said Ken Shapiro, chief assistant director of the Marin County Department of Health and Human Services. "This property meets that need."

Opponents of the project, however, have raised a number of safety concerns. One is that tier one and tier two sex offenders will be permitted to live in the facility. Another is that 16 of the residents will have to have been diagnosed with a serious mental illness in order for the county to qualify for a \$6 million state grant funded by the Mental Health Services Act.

Opponents also objected to the fact that there will be no sobriety requirements for residents and that residents with mental health illnesses will be free to decline treatment.

"The fact that there are no drug or sobriety requirements and that the residents will be offered services but not required to participate in those services is unacceptable," said Jennifer Hamm, who said she has two young children. "This will draw those selling drugs to the area."

James Holmes said, "The offer of Homekey money would be great if there weren't so many strings attached, strings attached such as accepting the riskiest clientele, the demented, the addicted and the convicted."

Joan Warren of Greenbrae asked the supervisors, "Why would you bring chronic risk into this community, a neighborhood with thousands of children and seniors? Six schools, two preschools, three parks and three walking paths – those are our demographics. All within one and a quarter miles of 1251."

Erica Bonney, a Kentfield School District board member, repeated her district's objection to the site due to its location on a "safe route" to schools, and a representative of Ross Valley Nursery School said her school also opposes the project.

Safety wasn't the only objection raised by opponents of the project.

"It is fiscally irresponsible to use this amount of money to construct housing for 43 people that could house twice as many homeless should it be used in a less expensive location," said Melanie Wollenweber of Greenbrae.

Marin County officials estimate the project will cost the county a minimum of \$17.4 million over the next 15 years. The county expects to provide \$7.7 million to help cover the estimated \$26 million to \$29 million to acquire the dilapidated nursing center and make the necessary renovations. Marin County will provide another \$9.75 million over the next 15 years to help cover the \$28.6 million that it will cost to provide supportive services to homeless people who will live there.

The project also had passionate supporters.

Rebekah Helzel said many of Marin's housed residents have the same drug addiction and mental health issues as the county's homeless residents.

"The unhoused don't have the luxury of suffering behind closed doors with both monetary and moral support as those who are housed do," Helzel said. "They lost that roof over their head, that stability that can help them recover and build their lives."

Christopher Gilkerson said, "Statistics tell us that every one of us has a friend or family member that has at one time or another suffered from mental illness or drug addiction. That does not make them dangerous; it means they need help. It means they need homes."

Rachel Reid of Larkspur, said, "I encourage my fellow Larkspur residents to acknowledge our immense privilege and move beyond it to help those who are much less fortunate. We cannot stand for discrimination and unsubstantiated fear mongering. This is about humanity, compassion and treating those around us with respect and dignity."

Several local public officials spoke in support of the project, including state Sen. Mike McGuire, D-Healdsburg; San Rafael Mayor Kate Colin; Larkspur Councilman Kevin Haroff; and Corte Madera Councilman Bob Ravasio.

Rice's championing of the project was backed by all four of her fellow board members.

"I support this project and the process that is being put before us and am committed to its ongoing success," said Supervisor Damon Connolly, who is a candidate for state Assembly.

Said Supervisor Stephanie Moulton-Peters: "We care for our children, and we care for those who need help. We need to do both. We can't just do one half of the equation.

"We can't be so focused on the things that might go wrong that we miss the opportunity to do what is right," she said.

Marin awarded \$15M for Larkspur homelessness project

Marin County has been awarded a \$15.49 million state grant to help convert a former skilled nursing center in Larkspur into housing for homeless people.

The Board of Supervisors is set to vote Tuesday on whether to accept the grant, which was a Project Homekey allocation announced this week by Gov. Gavin Newsom. The project has created a furor among residents who live close to the site at 1251 S. Eliseo Drive.

More than 2,400 people have signed an online petition objecting to the plan, which aims to create housing for 43 to 50 chronically homeless people. The Kentfield School District has voiced its opposition, noting that the site is located on a "safe route" to schools.

"I watched protests this morning outside of the local schools," Larkspur Councilman Scot Candell said Friday. "I expect there to be a large turnout at that meeting. The county has not been attentive to the voices of the residents of Larkspur and has not addressed their concerns adequately."

Supervisor Katie Rice, whose district includes Larkspur, said, "A project like this is an incredible opportunity to bring the most vulnerable into housing and provide the services they need to regain their health and well-being."

The county estimates the project will cost the county a minimum of \$17.4 million over the next 15 years.

County managers say it will cost \$26 million to \$29 million to acquire the dilapidated nursing center and make the necessary renovations. Only \$12.9 million of the state grant can be used for this purpose; the remaining \$2.59 million must be used to help cover operating costs.

Ken Shapiro, chief assistant director of the Marin County Department of Health and Human Services, expects the remainder needed to cover acquisition and renovation costs to come from a variety of sources — \$7.7 million from Marin County, \$2 million from the Marin Community Foundation and \$6 million from a state grant funded by the Mental Health Services Act.

Shapiro said the county expects to find out if it will be awarded the \$6 million grant sometime this summer. In order for the project to qualify for that money, 16 of the apartments must be used to house chronically homeless people who suffer from "serious" mental illness.

"The price keeps going up," said project opponent Björn Stansvik. "I saw an early estimate that it was going to cost \$20 million or so, and then the other day I saw it was going to be \$26 million."

Shapiro said one reason the cost has risen is that project planners have decided that each apartment will have its own private bathroom instead of shared communal bathrooms as initially contemplated. Shapiro said the county has done its best to provide a realistic estimate given that no construction contracts have been signed yet.

Despite its financial contribution, the county will not own the building. Ownership will be turned over to San Francisco-based Episcopal Community Services, which will operate the center.

In addition to the purchase and renovation costs, project planners also have had to figure out where the money will come from to provide support services to people who will be housed at the site.

The center is intended to fit into the county's "housing first" strategy of addressing homelessness. The strategy focuses on getting the chronically homeless — people who have been homeless for at least one year and have a physical, mental or addiction-related disability — housed with supportive services.

To be eligible for housing at the center, residents will have to meet this definition of chronic homelessness.

Services will include intensive case management, behavioral health services, workforce development and benefits assistance, according to a website that has been created to brief the public on the project.

Shapiro estimates that it will cost about \$1.9 million annually to pay for these support services. In order to get the state grant, the county was required to commit to covering these costs for 15 years, which amounts to \$28.5 million.

Shapiro said the county believes, however, that it will have to contribute only \$9.75 million, roughly \$600,000 per year. Project-based housing vouchers supplied by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development are expected to defray \$16.2 million over 15 years. The state grant just received includes \$2.59 million for operating costs.

"This program will address a critical need for safe, stable, permanent housing in Marin, and it's a wonderful addition to the work that we have been doing together to address homelessness and create a place for people to belong to the community," said Mary Kay Sweeney, the executive director of Homeward Bound of Marin, which operates the county's emergency shelters for the homeless.

Nevertheless, the proposed project has galvanized a large group of Ross Valley residents who oppose it.

"The whole sense of a safe community will change," said Stansvik, who has three young children. "We were out picketing on Sir Francis Drake Boulevard today and yesterday. I've never protested in my entire life before."

David Havlek of Kent Woodlands participated in a discussion of the project hosted by the Larkspur City Council on Tuesday. Havlek wrote a letter to county supervisors on Thursday blasting the project. He said he plans to attend next week's supervisors meeting in person.

"It's politically activated me to say, gosh, I need to be more involved in my community," Havlek said.

It takes a village to maintain an adequate blood supply and your efforts are so appreciated...Vitalant needs around 5,300 donations every day to help save lives. This time **60 donors came from Larkspur, Greenbrae and Corte Madera**! It's great to see the community involvement continuing to grow!

Below are just a few of the many patient stories we received recently, who may have a chance at another tomorrow thanks to the efforts of blood drives like yours:

- While undergoing a triple coronary artery bypass, a 57 year old man needed three O+ red cell units, and one platelet unit.
- A 50 year old woman undergoing a colonoscopy with mucosal resection received four AB+ red cell units, three platelet units and four plasma units.
- Abdominal aortic aneurysm repair was the reason a 63 year old woman needed seven A+ red cell units, one platelet unit and four plasma units.
- While undergoing treatment for anemia, hemoptysis, and malignant mesothelioma, a 46 year old man needed three O- red cell units.

It's fantastic to have those of you that can, stop by on the day of the drive. Special thanks to Gus who helped folks get signed in at the front, checking masks/ID etc. and the outstanding efforts of the Rec. Center, who allow us to be guests in their home and are fantastic hosts. And of course an overwhelming "hats off" to Erik, who continues to astonish us all with his efforts coordinating the largest blood drive in Marin County! Additionally, he signed up 95 people for the May drive!

SUBJECT: LAFCo Fee Schedule Change To Help Clean-up Boundaries.

At the February 10, 2022 LAFCo meeting the Commission approved an update to our fee schedule to help clean up the issue where you may be serving a parcel that was never correctly annexed into boundaries. LAFCo approved this update because after talking with a few agencies it seems like some have realized that over the years that one or more parcels received services but never properly went through the LAFCo process. In order to help clean these items up LAFCo is willing to offer a one time free application process for you to use. While the LAFCo application fee will not be charged, you will still be responsible for all third-party fees needed to complete this process.

While each agency will need to work to determine what parcels they currently serve that are outside of its boundary, LAFCo is here to help with that process. For example, LAFCo recently put on our website a searchable spreadsheet of all our applications dating back to LAFCo formation in 1963 so we can see if a parcel ever had an application for annexation. Staff can also help pull historical maps we have of your agencies. Your agency may also find parcels you are serving based on comparing maps of your service area to what is in Marin Map which is LAFCo's official mapping system. In addition, you can review the County's Foreign Parcel List or direct billing you do. Once you have reviewed everything and have determined one or more parcels need to be approved by LAFCo we are asking that you provide one list of all parcels to be brought to LAFCo to qualify for this policy. LAFCo will work with each agency to determine if it makes sense to have it be one application or a group of applications for approval.

So you are aware not all parcels you serve outside of your boundary may need to go through this action. If you have a LAFCo approved Out of Service (OSA) agreement for any parcel those parcels would not qualify for this new policy and don't need to be formally annexed into your boundary. In addition any emergency OSA that has been granted by LAFCo where the applicant did not complete the application for formal annexation will not be granted within this free application. Those still need to use the normal fee schedule to get approvals.

LAFCo staff is here to help to make sure your boundaries are correct. In addition I will be attending the Marin County Special District Association meeting on March 9th at 2:30pm to present on this matter and answer any questions. I encourage you to attend that meeting to find out more. Should you have any questions on this process please let me know.


