a. KAPF Labor Contract Negotiation Process -

The Board entered a Closed Session at 5:03 p.m.

The Board adjourned and entered back into Open Session at 5:12 p.m.

Director Gerbsman stated the Kentfield Fire Protection District and the KAPF have agreed on the items in the new MOU. The Board approves. This will take effect July 1, 2024, and the KAPF has a copy. Director Murray thanked Association President Tescallo, Engineer Nelson, and Engineer Beltramo for meeting with the Board subcommittee.

M/S Murray/Evergettis to approve the Memorandum of Understanding Between the Kentfield Association of Professional Firefighters and the Kentfield Fire Protection District. Contract Period July 1, 2024 – June 30, 2027

NEW BUSINESS:

a. Type 3 Fire Engine Update and Budget Adjustment FY 2023/24 – Kentfield Fire District signed a contract with High-Tech in October of 2021 for a Type 3 Fire Engine. The District made a down payment of \$167k at that time with the agreement the remaining balance of \$305k would be paid upon the completion of the engine. Chief Pomi explained due to supply chain issues and delays, the cabin chassis has not arrived in California and has not been completely built. The Type 3 Fire Engine is currently in Ohio and will not be completed by the end of this fiscal year. Chief Pomi requested a budget adjustment; to transfer the \$305k from #4070 Apparatus Replacement back into category #6910 Apparatus Replacement Assigned Fund balance. With the preliminary budget for fiscal year 2024-25, the District can once again reverse the transfer to prepare for the final payment of the Type 3 Fire Engine. Chief Pomi

stated these line item adjustments would decrease category #4070 Apparatus Replacement from \$605k to \$300k and increase category #6910 Apparatus Replacement to \$305k.

M/S Gerbsman/Naso to approve the Capital Outlay Apparatus Replacement Fund Transfer to Apparatus Replacement Assigned Fund Balance.

b. *Preliminary Budget Fiscal Year 2024-25* – Chief Pomi referenced the proposed preliminary 2024-25 Budget provided in the Board packed and presented the following highlights:

REVENUE

9001/Property Tax Current Secured – The projected variance is about \$228,150 for a total of \$5,931,922. 9046/ Excess ERAF – The District is unsure what will happen with ERAF and is choosing to stay on the conservative side, estimating a negative variance of \$72,372 for a total of \$220,628.

9905/AT&T Lease Agreement – Reflects a 3% COLA increase.

9910/T-Mobile Lease Agreement – Reflects a 3% COLA increase.

9920/Marin General Hospital Contract - Reflects a 3% COLA increase.

Total revenue is projected to be \$7,874,520 for the year.

PERSONNEL

1030/Overtime – Reduced by about \$139k. Last year there weren't any out of county assignments, but this category can always be adjusted.

Total Personnel costs are projected to increase by \$155,423: from \$6,054,475 to \$6,209,898.

SERVICES & SUPPLY

2006/Consulting Fees – Increased by \$10k to \$28,500; preparing for the onboarding of a new record management system.

2105/Central Dispatch – At \$203,472, which includes the upfront costs for that first year for all the capital investments. The following year, that number will go back down to the \$140k range. This is just a one-time increase.

2315/Wellness/Fitness – \$15k increase to \$29k. This will allow more pre-cancer screening tests.

Total Services & Supply projected at a \$132,832 increase: from \$1,176,375 to \$1,309,207.

DEBT SERVICES

3110/Fire Station Renovation-Principal – The District made the final payment on the loan last December. The building is officially paid off and debt free.

Total Debt Services at \$0; a decrease of \$154,731 from last year.

CAPITAL OUTLAY

4005/MERA; Radios; CAD/iPads – Same as last year; \$25k.

4010/Computers - Same as last year; \$15k

4015/Fire Equipment – Same as last year; \$35k

4020/Hose - Increased by 10%; \$1,500 for a total of \$15k.

4035/Hydrants and Mains - Increased by 10%; \$1,200 for a total of \$12k.

4041/PPE - Increased by 10%; \$5,150 for a total of \$23,150.

4050/Building Repair – Increased by 10%; \$10k for a total of \$100k.

KENTFIELD FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT BOARD OF DIRECTORS MEETING

4070/Apparatus Replacement – Usually there is \$100k in this category, but with the additional \$305k for the Type 3 Fire Engine, the preliminary amount is \$405k.

Total Capital Outlay at \$640,150; a decrease of \$182,150 from last year.

BUDGET ANALYSIS

Total Revenue is increasing by \$271,640k at \$7.8 Million.

Total Projected Reserve Allocations was at \$605k last year in preparation to pay for the Utility, Tahoe, and the Type 3 Fire Engine. This year it's only \$305k for the Type 3 Fire Engine final payment. The projected fund balance for fiscal year 2024/25 will be \$20,265.

Chief Pomi stated the budget figures can change between the preliminary and the final, with future expenditures and/or increases in revenues. He asked if there were any questions. None were asked.

November 2024 District Candidate Elections – Chief Pomi stated Resolution 5-2024 acknowledges that Kentfield Fire Protection District has two regular term positions of four years, up for election and requests the election be consolidated with Marin County election. The election will be held on November 5, 2024. There are three documents to review from the Board packet: Resolution 5-2024, the District Boundary Confirmation Request form, and the Elected Officials and Term of Office document which reveals Director Corbet and Director Murray are up for re-election. Candidates will have an opportunity to submit the paperwork to run again at a later date. Chief Pomi asked if there were any questions. No questions were asked.

M/S Gerbsman/Evergettis to approve Resolution 5-2024 of the Kentfield Fire District Board of Directors proposing an election be held in its jurisdiction; requesting the Board of Supervisors to consolidate with any other election conducted on said date, and requesting election services by the Marin County Elections Department.

Survivor John Miller (not the Giants broadcaster), a recent retiree and an accomplished swimmer decided to join a new swim class at the College of Marin. John was found in the pool by the swim instructors who were able to provide immediate lifesaving interventions as well as activate 911 emergency services. With our quick response providing additional life support and advanced life support emergency medicine, John was able to fully recover and is enjoying life with a new appreciation for each day.

As professional firefighters and emergency medical providers, we are grateful to be a part of celebrating the life of a community member and be appreciated for the service we provide. The Kentfield Fire Protection District continues to provide the highest-level service to our community. We are thankful for the support of our Fire District, Fire Chief, and our Board of Directors.



Survivor John Miller



John Miller, a recent retiree, had decided to join a new swim class at College of Marin. At the end of the first class, the coach suggested the high dive for anyone brave enough to try. Already an accomplished swimmer, John took advantage of the offer.

Surfacing from the dive, John started up the ladder but fell back, unconscious. His fellow swimmers pulled him out of the pool and quickly determined he needed CPR. The swim instructor started CPR while others ran to get an AED. By this time, the EMT/firefighters from Kentfield Fire had arrived and continued the lifesaving efforts. Medic 18 took John immediately to the Cardiac Cath Lab at MarinHealth where he received

one stent. John finished his recovery at Kaiser San Rafael Medical Center.

John has since made a full recovery and is enjoying life with a new appreciation for each day.

Re: Resolution No. 6-2024, reporting of mandatory Inspections & Compliance per California

Senate Bill 1205

Date: June 12, 2024

BACKGROUND:

On September 27, 2018, SB 1205 became effective, adding a new section to the California Health and Safety Code (HSC) which affects every fire department or fire district in the State. SB 1205 holds jurisdictional policy makers accountable to make progress on fire prevention resource requests and ensures fire department funding allocations account for the longstanding needs of resource deficient fire prevention bureaus.

Existing California state law requires every fire department or district providing fire protection services to inspect every building used as a public or private school annually (HSC §13146.3). This same annual inspection requirement is applicable to hotels, motels, lodging houses, and apartment houses (HSC §13146.2). Currently, the Kentfield Fire Protection District is required by statute to annually inspect six (5) Group E occupancies, buildings, structures and/or facilities and twenty even (26) Group R (and their associated sub-categories) occupancies.

REQUIREMENTS:

SB 1205 requires every fire department or district providing fire protection services to enforce building standards and other regulations adopted by the State Fire Marshal (SFM) to annually report to its administering authority their compliance with the annual inspection requirements of the California Health and Safety Code. The bill also requires the administering authority to formally acknowledge receipt of the compliance report in a resolution or a similar formal document. Kentfield Fire Protection District Resolution 6-2024 has been prepared to meet the requirements of SB1205.

SUMMARY:

SB1205 requires local fire departments and fire districts to annually report on its compliance with inspections currently mandated in statute. Specifically, this bill:

- 1) Requires every city, county or district fire department required to perform annual inspections (pursuant to HSC Sec. 13146.2 and 13146.3) to annually report to administrative authority on its compliance of said inspections.
- 2) Requires the report to occur when the administering authority discusses its annual budget, or at another time determined by the administering authority.
- 3) Requires the administering authority acknowledge receipt of the report in a resolution or a similar formal document.
- 4) Defines "administering authority" as a city council, county board of supervisors, or district board, as the case may be.

RESOLUTION NO. 6-2024

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF THE KENTFIELD FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT ACKNOWLEDGING RECEIPT OF A REPORT MADE BY THE FIRE CHIEF OF THE KENTFIELD FIRE PROTECTION DISTRICT REGARDING THE INSPECTION OF CERTAIN OCCUPANCIES REQUIRED TO PERFORM ANNUAL INSPECTIONS IN SUCH OCCUPANCIES PURSUANT TO SECTIONS 13146.2 AND 13146.3 OF THE CALIFORNIA HEALTH AND SAFETY CODE.

WHEREAS, California Health & Safety Code Section 13146.4 was added in 2018, becoming effective on September 27, 2018; and,

WHEREAS, California Health & Safety Code Sections 13146.2 and 13146.3 requires all fire departments and Districts, including the Kentfield Fire Protection District, that provide fire protection services to perform annual inspections in every building used as a public or private school, hotel, motel, lodging house, apartment house, and certain residential care facilities for compliance with building standards, as provided and,

WHEREAS, California Health & Safety Code Section 13146.2 requires all fire departments all fire departments and Districts, including the Kentfield Fire Protection District, that provide fire protection services to report annually to its administering authority on its compliance with Sections 13146.2 and 13146.3 and,

WHEREAS, the Board of the Kentfield Fire Protection District intends this Resolution to fulfill the requirements of the California Health & Safety Code regarding acknowledgment of the Kentfield Fire Protection District's compliance with California Health and Sections 13146.2 and 13146.3

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Board of the Kentfield Fire Protection District that said Board expressly acknowledges the measure of compliance of the Kentfield Fire Protection District with California Health and Safety Code Sections 13146.2 and 13146.3 in the area encompassed by the Kentfield Fire Protection District, as follows:

A. EDUCATIONAL GROUP E OCCUPANCIES:

Educational Group E occupancies are generally those public and private schools, used by more than six persons at any one time for educational purposes through the 12th grade. Within the Kentfield Fire Protection District, there lie five (5) Group E occupancies, buildings, structures and/or facilities.

During calendar year 2023, the Kentfield Fire Protection District completed the annual inspection of five (5) Group E occupancies, buildings, structures and/or facilities. This is a compliance rate of 100 % for this reporting period.

B. RESIDENTIAL GROUP R OCCUPANCIES:

Residential Group R occupancies, for the purposes of this resolution, are generally those occupancies containing sleeping units, and include hotels, motels, apartments (three units or more), as well as other residential occupancies (including a number of residential care facilities). These residential care facilities have a number of different sub-classifications, and they may contain residents or clients that have a range of needs, including those related to custodial care, mobility impairments, cognitive disabilities, etc. The residents may also be non-ambulatory or bedridden. Within the Kentfield Fire Protection District, there lie twenty-six (26) Group R (and their associated sub-categories) occupancies of this nature.

During calendar year 2023, the Kentfield Fire Protection District completed the annual inspection of twenty-six (26) Group R occupancies, buildings, structures and/or facilities. This is a compliance rate of 100 % for this reporting period.

Kentfield Fire Protection District is a special district formed under the authority of the California Health and Safety Code. The District has an excellent Class 1 ISO (Insurance Services Office) rating. The Kentfield Fire Protection District provides all-risk emergency response. We care for, protect, and serve more than 12,000 residents.

The District operates on a fiscal year from July 1 through June 30. Each year, the Board must adopt a preliminary budget before June 30 to allow the District to spend funds effective July 1 the following fiscal year. The Board adopts a final budget by the end of July.

Our Vision is to continue excellence in fire service delivery, operationally, financially, and politically.

Our Mission: The Kentfield Fire Protection District exists to care for, protect, and serve our communities.

Your blood drives continue to run more smoothly each time. Thank you to each of you for your part in supporting this community blood drive. Here are a few highlights from Tuesday:

- 180 people signed up in advance, and 149 registered, resulting in 133 successful donations and 152 red cell units, including 10 plasma donations.
- 20 of the donations were Power Red! Red cells are the most common components transfused to patients. and donating Power Red can double the impact of a donation. This automated donation collects a concentrated donation of red calls that can help twice as many patients.
- There were **5 First Time donors**, which is outstanding! I think the electronic billboard and newsletters are a tremendous help to bring in new donors!
- 54 of the donors were from the Larkspur (18)/Greenbrae (11)/Corte Madera(18) area.
- A huge shout out to our volunteers, Sherry and Gus, who kept things running smoothly throughout the blood drive...checking people in and giving away t-shirts, as well as signing people up for future drives, and answering so many questions. Thank you!
- Erik, Chief Pomi and Steve I/we can never thank you enough for all you do to make this happen. And to the rest of you...my appreciation goes to each of you for your part in this community blood drive!



Here are just a few of the many patient stories we received recently, who received the precious gift of blood:

- 63-year-old woman Aortic Valve Replacement used 4 red cell units B+
- 46-year-old man Gastrointestinal Bleeding used 4 red cell units A+
- 38-year-oldwoman C-Section, Postpartum Coagulation Defect used 6 red cell units, 3 platelets, and 12 plasma units A-

Most of the population is eligible, but **less than 3% donate**. Recent FDA changes to eligibility guidance, including the Individual Donor Assessment and European travel, may mean those once deferred can give. Details: **vitalant.org/eligibility.**

NEXT GENERATION PROJECT May 2024 Governing Board UPDATE:

Construction:

Construction is complete on all MERA sites and Punch List and Change Orders are being reviewed for Bid Package 3 and Bid Package 4 sites.

Radio Network:

Motorola has completed network installation at all sites. System optimization is scheduled to be completed by the end of May 2024.

TVSS work is complete at Civic Center, Dollar Hill, and Tiburon sites and is in progress for San Pedro, Big Rock, and Mill Valley.

Microwave:

Nokia is currently finishing path testing and punch list items. All sites will be reviewed by Motorola, Federal Engineering, and Marin County Radio Shop by mid-May 2024.

Fire Station Alerting:

RedCloud has assigned a project team and installation is underway. Wiring will begin on May 6th, 2024, lasting 4-5 weeks. Functionality testing by Mach Alert is scheduled to begin in mid-July 2024. Reps from Hexagon, Mach Alert, Motorola, and MERA meet regularly to ensure project progress.

Connectivity:

Motorola testing report for network connectivity has been received by MERA and is being reviewed. Novato Fire Protection District is installing FSA links at all 5 stations. For areas with limited coverage, Cradlepoints are being set up for system access. Federal Engineering is working with Marin IT on the closeout of network pilot project.

Cutover:

Cutover schedule provided by Motorola anticipates cutover to begin in September/October 2024. The process will require each agency to move over to new talk group templates and new frequencies, stepping away from the existing Gen 1 System. Cutover Plan specifics have been updated following the recent meeting in April 2024. MERA will also be replacing Marin County's Volunteer Paging Network with new technology. New equipment will be installed in all Dispatch Centers prior to final cutover creating a smooth transition.

Honoring Dave Jeffries:

On Tuesday, May 14th, at 6 PM, the Novato City Council will honor former Novato Police Captain Dave Jeffries.

Please join us at this meeting to recognize and celebrate Dave's many years of public safety and emergency management service. After the formal presentation, one of Dave's Incident Management teammates is organizing a casual gathering at a local downtown establishment. This will be a relaxed and informal opportunity to honor Dave. No RSVP is required.

2024/25 Work Plan Approved!

Re: Governor's Proposed Budget: Charter School Eligibility for Education Revenue Augmentation Funds – OPPOSE

Dear Senator Weiner and Assemblymember Gabriel,

On behalf of the Kentfield Fire District, I write to convey our strong opposition to the Governor's 2024-25 budget proposal regarding Charter School Eligibility for Education Revenue Augmentation Funds (ERAF). This proposal would result in the permanent loss of \$1.1 to \$2.7 million annually in Excess ERAF funding to 65 local governmental entities throughout Marin County that deliver vital transportation, public safety, and other services.

We understand the difficult situation of the state budget this year, and that tough budgetary decisions must be made. However, given other proposed cuts to state safety net programs, infrastructure funding, and other state-administered services, now is not the time to also pass on additional ongoing - and disproportionate - cuts to a handful of counties, cities and special districts, as we are facing difficult challenges of our own.

As you know, Excess ERAF results from ERAF property tax funds left over once the state has fulfilled its funding obligations to Marin schools and community colleges. Excess ERAF funds collected from Marin residents are then returned to Marin County, its cities, towns, and special districts to provide public services. The services supported by Excess ERAF provide some of the most direct impacts on the day-to-day lives of residents, including parks and libraries, public safety, affordable and workforce housing, economic vitality, initiatives to address homelessness, and other key local government functions.

Many residents who rely most on these services include vulnerable, low-income communities of color, older adults, those living with disabilities, and unhoused residents. We know these groups would be most affected by any ongoing cuts to Excess ERAF revenues because **cuts to the general fund will mean cuts to discretionary services**.

At the Kentfield Fire District some of the largest discretionary, general fund-funded programs include firefighter cancer screening, behavioral health programs, and recruitment and retention initiatives. Furthermore, solving state fiscal challenges with local Excess ERAF revenues sets a dangerous precedent. Local governments, with small budgets and limited room to manage cuts without serious consequences to local services, should not disproportionately shoulder the burden of the state's deficit.

To be clear, we **strongly support our public schools** and are concerned with any funding cuts that impact learning and education. However, this proposal maintains the same level of state funding to our charter schools while reducing **funding to public libraries**. The net result is a loss in public education funding in our communities.


Finally, we not only believe that this proposal is poor public policy because of the reasons stated in this letter, but we also maintain that Excess ERAF funds are constitutionally protected for the localities that generate them. Please see the attached February 14, 2024, letter from the Marin County Executive which highlights these legal concerns.

Thank you for your consideration of our concerns, and we urge the state not to move forward with the Governor's proposal, which would result in permanent cuts to dozens of local entities without benefiting our schools.

Re: Governor's Proposed Budget: Charter School Eligibility for Education Revenue Augmentation Funds – OPPOSE

Dear Senator Weiner and Assemblymember Gabriel,

On behalf of the Marin County Board of Supervisors, I write to oppose the Governor's budget proposal that purports to "clarify" that charter schools are eligible to receive Education Revenue Augmentation Funds (ERAF)¹. This is the latest in a series of attempts by the State Department of Finance (DOF) to take constitutionally protected funds from local governments for State use at the expense of local health and safety programs and services.

ERAF allocations are constitutionally protected.

Faced with a fiscal crisis in 1992, the Legislature, seeking to meet State minimum educational funding obligations under Proposition 98, required local governments to shift a significant portion of their local property tax revenues into a newly established Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund (ERAF). Under that scheme, once school funding levels were met, any remaining property tax contributions in the ERAF were considered "excess ERAF". Excess ERAF must be returned pro rata to the county, cities, and special districts that originally contributed those property taxes to ERAF.

To satisfy the State's constitutional school funding obligations, the Legislature has periodically mandated additional funding shifts, significantly impairing local government budgets and planning efforts. In 2004, as a State budget balancing compromise, the Legislature and the Administration agreed to a one-time local shift in funding (known as "the triple flip") in exchange for putting a measure on the ballot (Proposition 1A), which was adopted by fully 83.7 percent of the State's voters. That constitutional amendment prohibits the Legislature "from reduc[ing] for any fiscal year the percentage of the total amount of ad valorem property tax revenues in a

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county that are allocated among the county, cities, and special districts in that county below the percentage that was allocated among those agencies on November 3, 2004."²

The Legislative Analyst's Prop 1A ballot summary stated that the measure "[e]nsures local property tax and sales tax revenues remain with local government thereby safeguarding funding for public safety, health, libraries, parks, and other local services." "Proposition 1A was intended to prevent the Legislature from statutorily reducing the existing allocations of property taxes among cities, counties, and special districts. In essence, it was intended to stop the periodic funding shifts of property tax revenues from local agencies to satisfy the State's school funding obligations."

The Governor's Proposal, in any case, in unconstitutional.

One of DOF's most recent attempts was to erroneously assert that excess ERAF decreases school funding statewide. They also supported the California School Boards Association in a lawsuit challenging the State Controller's determination that charter schools are not entitled to receive ERAF⁵. Both the trial and appellate courts rejected their arguments⁶. DOF now seeks to "clarify" a matter already addressed in statutes and expressly decided by the courts. DOF's proposal to change the law to use excess ERAF to fund charter schools, even if successful legislatively to provide the "clarity" they seek, would explicitly violate the California Constitution because it would reduce the total percentage of property tax revenues allocated to counties, cities, and special districts below the amount that was in effect on November 3, 2004 when Proposition 1A was enacted.

The Governor's Proposal would have significant consequences to local governments.

Apart from conflicting with Proposition 1A, the proposal would yield no additional funding to charter schools or school districts. State law already provides a mechanism for charter schools to receive "local" funding through "in lieu" payments from their host school district. However, the impact to the affected local governments, including Santa Clara, San Mateo, San Francisco, Marin, Napa, and Alpine Counties, would be significant.

In Marin County, the proposed budgetary change affects 65 governmental entities and would cost the Marin community \$1.1 million per year, including approximately \$713,000 per year to the County of Marin and the Marin County Free Library; \$179,000 to Marin's eleven cities and towns; and \$173,000 to various special district

agencies. This latest effort by the state to take local revenue would compound local fiscal challenges, including critical public programs and safety net services to our most vulnerable populations.

We respectfully urge the Legislature to reject this latest State taking of property tax revenue, which violates the clear voice of the voters of the State of California when they approved Prop 1A in 2004 – and purportedly does so in the name of charter schools when, in fact, charter schools will not benefit.


